INTRODUCTION: ABOUT CAMP FURY



WHO WE ARE

Camp Fury is a collaborative program that provides hands-on activities that promote the development of leadership skills, teamwork, respect, and self-confidence.

PROGRAM GOALS

At Camp Fury, girls train alongside firefighters and law enforcement personnel to learn fire and EMS skills, police tactics and crime scene investigation techniques, and perform physical fitness drills. They meet women who are breaking down barriers and stereotypes in these male-dominated career fields.



FOUNDERS LAURA BAKER

Laura is Assistant Chief for the Tucson Fire Department (TFD). She has been with TFD since 1994. Laura promoted through the ranks of firefighter, paramedic, captain, deputy chief and assistant chief. She has served as the deputy chief in training, fire prevention, and operations.

She is currently responsible for medical administration and safety, fire prevention and public education and the communications center.

Laura received her Bachelor of Science in Business Administration from UC Berkeley in



1992 and received an Associates degree in Para-medicine from Pima Community College in 1997. Laura earned a Master of Science in Fire Service Administration from Arizona State University in December 2004. Laura completed the Executive Fire Officer Program (EFOP) in March 2007.

Laura is Past President for the International Association of Women in Fire and Emergency Services. The mission of the International Association of Women in Fire and Emergency Service (iWomen) is to provide a proactive network that supports, mentors, and educates current and future women in the fire and emergency services. iWomen is dedicated to improving the fire service through the involvement and success of women.

CHERYL HORVATH

Cheryl Horvath is the Fire Chief, Mountain Vista Fire Department in Tucson, Arizona. Cheryl has been in the fire service since 1992, working as a full-time firefighter in Illinois where she served as union president for four years, and as a field instructor for the Illinois Fire Service Institute in live fire, technical rescue, fire ground management, and officer programs. Upon moving to Tucson and accepting a position as a shift battalion chief for NWFD, Cheryl has since served the District in every division chief capacity (Training, Operations, and



Logistics), and is now focusing her efforts on assisting the District strategically, both internally and externally. She is the past President of the Board of Trustees for the International Association of Women in Fire & Emergency

Services and a frequent speaker at local, state, and national conferences in leadership, strategic thinking and fire ground tactics.

As a co-founder of Camp Fury along with Chief Laura Baker from Tucson Fire Department, Cheryl is humbled by the growth of the program and honored to serve beside so many public safety professional women who are dedicated to growing the number of young women in nontraditional occupations. Through the support of the Tucson community Camp Fury is looked upon as a premier program for young women in building Courage, Confidence, and Character.

CHERYL HORVATH continued

Cheryl is a community volunteer, serving as Vice Chair on the Board of Directors for the Girl Scouts of Southern Arizona and as treasurer on the Board of Directors for the January 8th Memorial Foundation. She was the recipient of the 2010 YWCA Women on the Move Award, for her service to the greater Tucson community. Cheryl holds a Master's in Public Administration degree from Anna Maria College; a Bachelor's of Science degree from the University of Illinois; an Associate's Degree in Fire Science from Parkland Community College.

Last year Cheryl and her daughter Cai were able to rappel together during Camp Fury, a once in a lifetime experience. Cheryl enjoys playing golf, hiking the beautiful mountains around Tucson, and spending time with friends and family who help her stay grounded in what is most important in life.

HISTORY



2009

Chief Laura Baker of Tucson Fire Department and Chief Cheryl Horvath of Northwest Fire Rescue District received grant funding in 2009 from the Women's Foundation of Southern Arizona to facilitate a girl's fire camp for young women in the community. They created an innovative camp model that exposes teen girls to careers in firefighting. The initial two and a half day camp included resume building, guest presenters and leadership development in addition to physical fitness training and skill rotation. Participants were outfitted in turnout gear, helmets and gloves for the camp.

2010

In June 2010 the Tucson Fire Department and Northwest Fire Rescue District partnered with the Girl Scouts of Southern Arizona to sponsor a fire camp for high school girls. This innovative four day program highlighted firefighting and emergency service activities and featured guest speakers from non-traditional professions. Twenty-three girls participated in the program, ranging in age from 13 to 17, and representing high schools across the greater Tucson region with one camper traveling from Flagstaff, Arizona. Women firefighters from Tucson, Northwest, Rincon Valley, Glendale Fire, and Yuma Fire Departments provided the daily skills instruction.



2011

In April of 2011, Camp Fury made its debut in Yuma.

Girls in grades 6th through 12th experienced the life of a firefighter in a three-day camp (two half days). Camp Fury-Yuma was facilitated by City of Yuma firefighters in partnership with the Girl Scouts of Southern Arizona and was designed to build team working skills, selfconfidence, and respect in the young ladies that attend. It also provides girls an opportunity to experience a career as a firefighter. In addition, the girls learned about being prepared for an emergency and how crucial it is to the community to be prepared.

In June 2011 the Tucson Fire Department and Northwest Fire Rescue District continued their partnership with the Girl Scout of Southern Arizona to sponsor a Camp Fury for the second year. The camp continued the tradition of providing a program filled with firefighting and emergency service activities, featured guest speakers from nontraditional professions, and leadership skills. Fourteen girls participated in the program, ranging in age from 13 to 17, and representing high schools across the greater Tucson region. Women firefighters from Tucson, Northwest, Rincon Valley, Glendale Fire, and Yuma Fire Departments provided the daily skills instruction.



2012

In April 2012, Yuma held their second annual Camp Fury. Girls in grades 6th through 12th experienced the life of a firefighter in a four-day (split over two weekends) camp. The camp continues to provide activities and speakers that allowed girls to explore the fire services as a viable career choice.

In June 2012, eighteen girls throughout Southern Arizona including girls from Wilcox and Hereford attend Camp Fury - Tucson. Now in its fourth year, the camp offerings continue to grow with girls benefitting from increased hands-on activities, demonstrations, and drills. In addition to exercising and training with fire and emergency services professionals, girls don full firefighting gear and jump right in the action themselves. Over the course of the four days girls underwent physical fitness training in addition

to activities including an aerial climb, rappel, bucket brigade, search and rescue drills and water safety. Girls also volunteered their time at the National Fallen Fire Fighters Dinner/Auction.

Two representatives from the Hampton, Va. Fire Department visited Camp Fury in an effort to replicate it in their community.

2013

In April 2013, Yuma held their third annual Camp Fury. Girls in grades 6th through 12th experienced the life of a firefighter in a two-day camp. The camp continues to provide activities and speakers that allowed girls to explore the public services jobs as a viable career choice.

In May 2013, twenty girls throughout Southern Arizona attend Camp Fury -Tucson. Now in its fifth year, the camp offerings continue to grow with girls benefitting from increased hands-on activities, demonstrations, and drills. The team expanded its partnership to include several local law enforcement agencies that added activities such as defensive tactics, crime scene investigation techniques, handcuffing, gun safety, and building clearing.

The camp continues to offer one camper a \$500 Scholarship to Pima Community College from The Greater Tucson Fire Foundation. The team introduced a new scholarship, Girl Scout Leadership Award that is awarded to one camper who exhibits leadership skills at a novice level and is interested in developing those skills for future leadership opportunities.



2014

In January 2014, Yuma held their fourth annual Camp Fury. Girls in grades 6th through 12th experienced the life of a firefighter in a 2 day camp. The camp continues to provide activities and speakers that allowed girls to explore the public services jobs as a viable career choice.

In May 2014, twenty-three girls throughout Southern Arizona attend Camp Fury – Tucson. Now in its sixth year, the camp offerings continue to grow with girls benefitting from increased hands-on activities, demonstrations, and drills. The team expanded its partnership to include several local law enforcement agencies. Five squad leaders who are past camp participants, ages 18 to 20, served as camp leaders.

Three representatives from the Charlotte Fire Department, Charlotte, NC. visited Camp Fury in an effort to replicate the program in their community.

2015

In April 2015, Yuma held their fifth annual Camp Fury. Girls in grades 6th through 12th experienced the life of a firefighter in a two-day camp. The camp continues to provide activities and speakers that allowed girls to explore the public services jobs as a viable career choice.





In May 2015, twenty-four girls (one from Maine) experienced what it's like to work as first responders, firefighters and public safety personnel. They trained alongside public safety personnel to learn rescue skills, fitness drills and crime scene investigation techniques. Six squad leaders who are past camp participants, ages 18 to 20, served as camp leaders.

The Camp Fury program has become a model for others in the country and a secondary program has been developed in Yuma. Camp Fury has been replicated in Hampton, Virginia and Charlotte, North Carolina, and for the first time a Girl Scout from outside of Arizona will be attending.

Several representatives from the Tempe PD, Mesa PD, Phoenix Fire Department, and Glendale Fire Department visited Camp Fury in an effort to replicate the program in their community.



PROGRAM ELEMENTS



PROGRAM DESCRIPTION AND OUTCOMES

The Camp Fury program is a high adventure, career exploration camp design to engage girls in hands-on activities. The camp also creates a space for women in nontraditional careers to come together and build stronger connections as they share their passion with teen girls. Outcomes include but are not limited to :

- Stronger sense of self
- Positive values
- Practical life skills
- Critical thinking
- Healthy relationships
- Cooperation and team building
- Conflict resolution
- Deeper connection to their community
- Resourceful problem solvers
- Educated and inspired to act

RECOMMENDATIONS

Identify previous campers, young female cadets, trainees, and firefighters to act as squad leaders for a group of no more than 8 campers. Squad leaders undergo basic counseling training with Girl Scout staffers. Squads go through activities together, eat together, and complete KAPERS together.



- Require sports physical for all camp participants
- Show video of camp at ceremony
- Identify dedicated team of volunteers/ staff to prepare camp food
- Hold parent/guardian meeting before camp check-in to gather paperwork and answer questions
- Staff meeting with volunteers, Girl Scout staff, squad leaders before orientation and each morning of camp before breakfast
- Identify dedicated photographer, videographer

SQUAD LEADERS

In 2013, the Camp Fury team decided to create the Squad Leader positions at camp in an effort to give returning campers an elevated experience. The Camp Fury team selects campers from the previous year who exhibited strong leadership and communication skills and invites them to take the opportunity to become a Squad Leader.

The Squad Leader position provided a selected group of returning campers to practice the leadership skills they have learned attending Camp Fury previously.

There are four Squad Leaders and one Head Squad Leader. The Head Squad Leaders acts as a liaison between the Squad Leaders and the Camp Fury team (staff, instructors, and volunteers).

Squad leaders responsibilities include:

- Maintaining a positive team attitude
- Making sure your team is where they need to be when they need to be there
- Participating in ALL activities with your team. You are a camper too!
- Role modeling proper behavior
- Managing minor conflicts and challenges that arise in the team

- Using your voice to clarify instructions/ details
- Ensuring your team takes advantage of "down time" to rehydrate and use the bathrooms
- Ensure your team members' safety by making sure they follow all rules and procedures, and are wearing proper protective gear provided



SQUAD LEADER TRAINING

GOAL To provide squad leaders with the tools, skills, and confidence for their role at Camp Fury.

OBJECTIVES

- Develop a team atmosphere amongst the squad leaders
- Squad leaders will have a clear understanding of their roles and responsibilities during Camp Fury
- Learn the Principles of Leadership
- Understand how to recognize and act respectfully in challenging situations
- Develop Leadership goals

SCHOLARSHIPS & AWARDS

Camp Fury offers one scholarship and two awards each year to campers who have exhibited outstanding leadership, teamwork, respect, and self-confidence.

Throughout camp staff, instructors, volunteers, and squad leaders take note of specific incidences where a camper went above and beyond expectation. In addition, they engage campers in conversation about what they have planned for the future and how Camp Fury will help support their goals.

Typically, the afternoon prior to the last day of camp all staff, instructions, volunteers, and squad leaders gather to discuss and finalize which camper will receive the scholarship and awards. Only one scholarship or award is given to one camper.

The Greater Tucson Fire Foundation honors one of the campers with a **\$500 scholarship** to continue their education in the fire service at Pima Community College. Qualifying candidates exhibit outstanding leadership and teamwork skills, are goal oriented and maintain a positive attitude throughout the camp.

Catching Fury

In 2013, the Camp Fury team facilitated a one-day Camp Fury Sampler for middle school girls (ages 11–13) called Catching Fury. Catching Fury provided middle school girls with the opportunity to gear-up and experience hands-on fire, emergency services, and law enforcement activities. Activities include ladders, hoselines, rappelling, compressions only CPR, fingerprinting, evidence collection, and blood spatter patterns.



Girls begin to understand the ranking systems of squad, squad leader, and instructor. Squad Leaders are Camp Fury campers who are given the opportunity to practice the leadership skills they learned at Camp Fury.

Objectives

- Learn leadership skills and team building
- Gain courage, confidence, and character
- Recruit future Camp Fury Campers
- Provide Camp Fury campers with the opportunity to practice leadership skills taught at Camp Fury

Camp Fury Executives

Camp Fury Executives is an extension of the Camp Fury Leadership Camp designed to further develop a young woman's potential to pursue careers and leadership roles in public service and non-traditional occupations. Teen girls and young women, ages 17 (or entering junior year of High School) and under 21, who have previously attended Camp Fury will be eligible to attend. The 3 day/2 night program offers up-andcoming young women the tools and skills needed to



pursue opportunities in non-traditional careers through professional writing, presentation, and public speaking. A commitment to promoting the Camp Fury/Catching Fury Programs in the community is a final requirement.

- Develop professional writing skills
- Practice public speaking and oration skills.
- Develop self and group presentation skills
- Promote the Camp Fury Program to the community.

Camp Fury Empowers Young Girls to Pursue Dreams in Law Enforcement and Fire Fighting Careers

Unique Girl Scout Summer Camp Runs May 26- May 30

Tucson, AZ (May 20, 2015) – This summer, 24 girls (23 from across Arizona and one from Maine) will experience what it's like to work as first responders, firefighters and public safety personnel at Girl Scout of Southern Arizona's annual Camp Fury.

The Girl Scouts of Southern Arizona will offer a comprehensive, fun, hands-on look at law enforcement and firefighting to southern Arizona girls in partnership with Tucson Fire Department, Tucson Police Department, Northwest Fire District, Pima County Sheriff's Department, Border Patrol, University of Arizona Police Department, Pima Community College Police Department and Marana Police Department.

Camp Fury is a five-day, four-night experience for girls, ages 15 to 17. They will train alongside public safety personnel to learn rescue skills, fitness drills and crime scene investigation techniques. Founded in 2009, by Assistant Chief of Tucson Fire Laura Baker and Northwest Fire District Chief Cheryl Horvath, Camp Fury was developed to introduce local girls to a career in firefighting while encouraging leadership and physical fitness.

"Camp Fury empowers girls to look into nontraditional jobs and know the sky is really the limit and there is nothing they can't do," said Debbie Rich, Chief Executive Officer, Girl Scouts of Southern Arizona. "At Girl Scouts we build girls of courage, character and confidence. We are proud of programs like Camp Fury that offer the encouragement our girls need to pursue their dreams. These girls are learning through hands-on experiences and through the mentorship of women in these fields that are traditionally male-dominated."

From Tuesday, May 26 through Saturday, May 30, 2015, girls will receive training from officers and firefighters from multiple law enforcement and fire and emergency service agencies. The girls will also get firsthand experience with search and rescue techniques like rappelling, aerial climbing and how to work a fire hose.

The girls will be led by six squad leaders who are past camp participants, ages 18 to 20, currently registered to participate in this summer's session. The week will end with a recognition ceremony to commemorate the successful completion of the training.

The Camp Fury program has become a model for others in the country and a secondary program has been developed in Yuma. Camp Fury has been replicated in Hampton, Virginia and Charlotte, North Carolina, and for the first time a Girl Scout from outside of Arizona will be attending.

Girl Scout Uses Camp Skills to Save Band Mate

The day started like any other school day for Erika Yee, a junior at University High School in Tucson. Erika and her band-section mates were enjoying dinner on the school grounds before band practice would start. In the middle of dinner, however, her band mate, Chris Miller, suddenly collapsed onto the floor. This is when Erika, who learned compression-only CPR at the Girl Scout's Camp Fury, jumped into action.

"They shouted out asking if anyone knew how to resuscitate someone. None of the adults or students in the room knew, so I acted on impulse and took control," explained Erika. She immediately began applying compressions to Chris. According to Erika, the three minutes it took for the ambulances to arrive "felt like 20 minutes, and I kept worrying that I would lose him because he was fading in and out."

Thanks to Erika's quick response and the swift arrival of paramedics, Chris' breathing returned and he was transported to the hospital.

Erika received this important training at Camp Fury, the annual fire-fighting camp organized by Northwest Fire Department, Tucson Fire Department and Girl Scouts of Southern Arizona. Melissa Ludgate, then a health education assistant at the UA Sarver Heart Center, was invited to teach these lifesaving skills. "My experience at Camp Fury in particular, was the first that jumped to my memory in order to help Chris. I believe everyone should learn how to do compression -only CPR," Erika urges.



Chris Miller, cardiac arrest survivor, and Erika Yee, his bandmate and rescuer, were reunited with Melissa Ludgate, who trained Erika at Camp Fury. Erika received a "Copper Letter" in honor of her heroic act from Tucson Mayor Jonathan Rothschild.

"It's very rewarding to know that the information I conveyed to someone led to lifesaving action in this case. I've used this story to tell other medical students how important our education and outreach activities are when it comes to the REACT [Resuscitation Education And CPR Training] Group," said Ludgate, who is now a medical student at the UA College of Medicine – Tucson and president of the REACT Group.
